I. Survey Description

The Friend's Parenting instrument in Wave XIX is a 12-item selection from a measure previously used in the Fast Track Project, called the Conflict Tactics Scale. This instrument is designed to establish the respondent's parenting skills. This measure, as is, consists of 6 questions from the original the Conflict Tactics Scale. The questionnaire establishes, first, the living status of the respondent with up to 5 children. Then it is followed by a selected list of items from the Conflict Tactics Scale measure (Strassberg et al). The Conflict Tactics Scale items measure frequency of occurrence of things the nominated friend of the respondent asserts the TC might have done to his/her child(ren). Original scales constructed using the Conflict Tactics Scale were omitted in this report, since a very few selected items of those original scales were actually used in the present instrument.

II. Report Sample

These analyses were conducted on peers of Fast Track participants from the first cohort on the high-risk control sample (n = 96) and the normative sample (n = 195) for the nineteenth year of the study. The distribution of respondents by site was as follows: for the control sample, 20 were from Durham, 20 were from Nashville, 28 were from Pennsylvania and 19 were from Washington. For the normative sample, 56

were from Durham, 44 were from Nashville, 58 were from Pennsylvania and 37 were from Washington. The Fast Track respondent was asked the following question (Q454) "Are you the biological or adoptive parent of a child?" This question is used to control the section of the questionnaire on parenting. For the friend of the TC (Fast Track - Target Child) the sample is reduced to 114 respondents who reported on his/her friend's parenting skills.

III. Scaling

No scales were constructed for this measure, since a limited number of items from the original were used in the instrument.

VI. Items Frequency Tables

Tables below follow the logic of the questionnaire by displaying frequencies by sample type (High and Low Risk) and living with children status and all items asked. This is followed by means and standard deviation for the two scales constructed by sample group (normative and control).
